FROM THE **RECTOR**

Summer Time, and the Living Is Easy

The days are longer, the weather is nice, the promise of vacation hangs in the air. It must be summer time.

It is traditional in many Episcopal churches, including Holy Trinity, to slow down in the summer. Communion and worship still happen, shut-ins are still visited, and the work of the church continues, but as our programs take a break, it allows times for reflection and preparation for the fall.

For the last several months, I have been talking about our **Core Values**, as identified by the Vestry at our February Vestry retreat. I have talked about how **Worship** is central to our identity as Christians (and especially Episcopal Christians); I have also talked about how **Mission/Outreach** is the natural response to our encounter with God in worship. In both, we look for the inspiration and movement of the Holy Spirit, directing our worship to a God who is active in the world, and inviting us to participate in his already-occurring work of reconciliation—gathering all creation back to God's self.

As we rest and relax for the summer, I want to talk about our **last three Core Values** because all five are front-and-center in our plans for the fall. The remaining three values are **Hospitality**, **Fellowship**, *and* **Formation**—and really, they all go together.

Since arriving at Holy Trinity, we have seen steady and consistent growth. Our Sunday attendance is up from last year, to 92 people on a Sunday. But more than that, we have consistently seen new families visiting Holy Trinity on a near weekly basis. They are attracted to the comfortable, kind, and welcoming character of the church. And this points us to one of our essential core values: **Hospitality**. As Christians, we are called to welcome everyone, not just into the church, but into our lives and into the life of Christ. To encourage this, the vestry and I have discussed and are implementing new ministries and changes that will make *everyone* feel welcome when they step into Holy Trinity. From their first visit to our website or Facebook page to their first visit to the church to their first participation in one of our activities, we want to be intentional about welcoming and including visitors into the life of the church. Because, at

one time or another, we have all been visitors at Holy Trinity, and we know that today's visitors are tomorrow's vestry members, lay leaders, and Eucharistic Ministers. We want to make it easy to call Holy Trinity home.

Closely related to Hospitality is our other core value of Fellowship. The church isn't just a place where we receive the sacraments, hear sermons, and learn about Jesus. Holy Trinity is our home-away-from-home. Holy Trinity is a family. Fellowship is what makes the family bonds stronger and brings the family together. The vestry and I are committed to making more opportunities—both official and unofficial—to bring *the whole church* together. We tend to think that Jesus fed his disciples so their mouths would be full and he could get some teaching done, but that's not the picture we get in the Bible. Jesus goes to weddings, and dinner parties, and cocktail parties. Fellowship is an important part of the church; it strengthens the body of Christ, helps incorporate new members into that life; and helps us "bear each other's burdens" (Gal 6:2), both good and bad.

Finally, the last core value and my personal favorite is Formation. The church is a place where we worship God, where we participate in God's work in the community, where we welcome newcomers, and where we fellowship with one another to strengthen the bonds of friendship and faith within the family of God. But we also want to *learn something* too! The vestry and I are committed to providing quality opportunities for Christian Formation for members of all ages. From the youngest kid to the oldest adult, we hope to provide places where tough questions can be asked, where faith can be cultivated and nurtured, and where we can grow into the full stature of Christ (Eph 4:13).

Those are the core values of Holy Trinity! The vestry and I have been intentional about couching all our work around these five areas: Worship, Mission/Outreach, Formation, Fellowship, and Hospitality. As you read the rest of this issue of the Banner, begin to think about how each of our upcoming activities fit into the various Core Values.

But, if you want to wait until after summer is over to do all that hard work—it's okay by me. Rest, relax, and rejuvenate. Because when fall comes, we will be going at a lighting pace. God's calling us; let's take this break to listen to what God's saying.



INTERFAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK (IHN)

Within Family Promise we have the opportunity to express our Christian faith by putting words into actions. Our Lord said that "what you do to the least of mine you do to me."

There are few greater difficulties in life than trying to raise a young family and losing your home. That is where we come in. At Holy Trinity, we offer families in Gloucester County a home for a week that is warm, inviting and fun. Our guests have a difficult life while staying with us, so we try to make it as comfortable and welcoming as possible.

The good news is that ALL the families that we hosted in May will be graduating in 4-6 weeks. Many full-time jobs have been found, cars have been secured, and Catholic Charities is offering to pay for half of their security deposits on new apartments. Family Promise is helping the families acquire the skills necessary to help them in the future, including money management, job training, and resume building classes, as well as family counseling.

Even as families are graduating from the program, 21 more families are on the waiting list. Our work is needed now more than ever. Our work with Family Promise is making an impact in the lives of the families we help. We are helping those in our community that need a little lift at the most difficult time in their lives. Thank you to our Family Promise volunteers; you are a committed and loving group that is impacting the lives of people in need. You help our guests feel at home and forget the stress of their situation. I thank God for your participation, and for our ability to participate in God's work through Family Promise in Gloucester County.

Parents must worry about providing two more meals per day per child. In many cases parents are eating less or skipping a meal in order to feed their children. It isn't easy working when you are hungry.

Now more than ever, we need to collect food for the Kitchen of Hope, so children will not go hungry during the day. No, we are not celebrating Christmas in July; we are talking a different type of "greening." We mean green energy!

In the past, groups have come in and given us a cost estimate for updating our facilities to be more energy efficient, including the subsequent savings to the church. Usually, they came back too expensive and with too little savings to make much difference. However, the state of New Jersey is offering a significant incentive to encourage non-profits to make their campuses more energy efficient—more "green."

Through this Direct Install program, New Jersey is picking up 70% of the cost of updating all the light fixtures (switching to LED) as well as replacing the two narthex air conditioning units. Both of these will generate significant savings for the church.

The total cost of our participation in the program is \$7390.68. We have been offered a three-year, interest-free loan from the gas company to cover the cost. With the amount we are estimated to save in a year's utility bills, the program should pay for itself in three years, at which point, the saving would continue. The Direct Install program also comes with a five-year warranty on all parts, so if anything should happen to the new lights or a/c units, we are covered for five years.

Our participation in this program addresses three important issues for Holy Trinity. First, it reduces our annual utility expense. Typically, this cost is relatively fixed (and generally increasing), so any reduction is beneficial for our annual expenditures. If we do save the estimated \$2500 a year, that's more money for missions and outreach.

Second, it helps us replace aging equipment that is due for replacement in the near future. The air conditioning units are 20-years old; the average life-span of an a/c unit is 10-15 years (although we don't use it continuously, so we could expect to get several more years out of it.) Participating in this program helps us replace the air conditioning units cheaply, while also shifting our thinking from short-term, patch-

work to long-term sustainability.

Finally, "greening" the church represents not only good financial and facility stewardship but stewardship for God's creation. The Fifth Mark of Mission of the "Five Marks of Mission" for the Episcopal Church (and the broader Anglican Communion) is "To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth." In a small way, we are helping safeguard and sustain our planet by using fewer resources and making our church more energy efficient.

We are waiting for a few more documents to be received, stamped, mailed, whatever the state does with it, but the hope is that the work would be completed by the fall.
