FROM THE **RECTOR**

To seek out new life and new civilizations, to boldly go...

When I think about "mission statements," two things pop into my head. First are those insufferable, jargon-heavy, corporate mandated vision casting exercises from the mid-to-late 1990s. Yuck!

The other is *Star Trek*.

Every episode of *The Next Generation* begins with a voice-over from Capt. Picard:

These are the voyages of the starship

Enterprise. Its five-year mission: to explore strange new worlds, to seek out new life and new civilizations, to boldly go where no man has gone before.

The Enterprise had a mission, a guiding principle that drove all its work and interactions in the universe. This is what a "mission statement" is supposed to be. Something that can be remembered, that can be ingrained in a community, and that can guide and transform the work of that community.

In our effort to discern where God is calling us, it seemed like the right time to retire our old mission statement and develop a new one. Taking into consideration our core values, our Episcopal identity, and our place in the community, we crafted a new mission statement:

Holy Trinity proclaims the Good News of God's grace to everyone!

As the church, Holy Trinity is in the business of transforming lives through the power of God's grace. We aren't just another volunteering or community minded service organization; we are the transformed, empowered Body of Jesus Christ, being called to participate in the work that God is already doing. We proclaim that the world has been changed by the death and resurrection of Christ. And we welcome, love, and invite everyone into that reality—no matter who they are, what they've done, or where they came from. We welcome everyone with open arms and hearts, sharing, with others, the grace that we received from God.

In our messy world, with its broken, beloved people, Holy Trinity launches its new mission statement as a response to what God has done, to what God is doing, and to the grace we have received through Jesus Christ.

We have been called; so we boldly go!

EXTEND YOUR LIFE: **VOLUNTEER**

FROM GAR MILLER

Like many of our senior church members, I'm a certified member of AARP, the retired organization that was actually introduced to me on my 50th birthday by a friend who I thought was being funny. I wasn't retired at the time, although little did I know that in two more years, I would be.

I quickly learned that there was nothing funny about the AARP concept at all and began to enjoy the many benefits of membership. There were savings on hotels, car rentals, and lots of other things—not to mention the advice the monthly magazine gave me.

Take, for instance, the June/July issue of 2017, which included an article about Time Share Bandits, which helped me erase the guilt I felt each time I enjoyed a free meal, but never bit on the buy-in timeshare offer. (Anybody else have that experience?) But even more important was the story that offered advice on extending my years of healthy life. Heck, who isn't all in for that?

The headline read, "Planning to Live to 100? Volunteer." If I can live with the health and zest for life that my life coach—the late beloved Claude Kennard—did, and volunteering is the vehicle that can help me get there, how wonderful.

Hardly a Sunday goes by in church without an announcement about an opportunity to participate—or volunteer—in some worthy activity. Outreach ministries like IHN, Kitchen of Hope, Bright Beginnings, etc. Or maybe it's a chance to participate more in the ministries of Holy Trinity—like teaching, reading, serving, or singing.

Not retired? There's something for everyone anyway; we always try to make it work and be flexible. But if you are retired, consider the benefits that sharing your skills and time can provide.

"A growing body of research tells us that those who volunteer have lower mortality rates and less depression, along with a greater sense of control over one's life and higher rates of self esteem and happiness," the article reported. Well, that sounds good.

When I (was forcefully) retired at 52, I had already been involved in scouting, even though I would rather gargle with bobcat urine than go camping. (I agreed to become troop chairman and hold it together for however long it took for my son Eric to make his Eagle). I had also been delivering meals to shut-ins through the government's "Serv-A-Tray" program. I continued that for some 25 years, and filled additional retiree hours by volunteering for many of the opportunities at Holy Trinity—choir (starting at age 50), editing the newsletter, serving as treasurer for 20 years, serving on the Vestry, participating in IHN, Kitchen of Hope, and various other opportunities. Throughout the process, my wife and I have made lots of new friends, but more importantly, enjoyed the satisfaction of helping others.

Will it get me to a healthy 100? I guess we'll have to wait and see about that.






Being a Christian in the 21st Century

DISCERNING OUR COMMON CALL

We at Holy Trinity understand the need for discernment. After all, we spent 18 months doing it! It was a valuable exercise, as it helped us to figure out who we were and what we wanted, as a church and as individual members of our congregation. It seems to have worked, as pretty much everyone I've spoken with enjoys having the Rev. Ben Maddison as our rector! Now the Diocese has decided they need to do the same thing. It's not because we're losing Bishop Stokes – in fact this is largely his idea – but it is because we haven't really looked at ourselves as a Diocese in a while, and we need to do some visioning in order to reevaluate our core values, our motivations, and our goals.

Therefore, the Diocese is holding a series of meetings, in each of the convocations, in order to discuss with the actual people of the Diocese who we are and what we want. They have come up with what they are calling "Vital Questions" which they have asked people to think about, and then these questions will form the basis of the convocation gatherings.

What is our relationship to Jesus Christ and how do we explain it?


What core values flow from this relationship?

INTERFAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK (IHN)

Within Family Promise we have the opportunity to express our Christian faith by putting words into actions. Our Lord said that "what you do to the least of mine you do to me."

There are few greater difficulties in life than trying to raise a young family and losing your home. That is where we come in. At Holy Trinity, we offer families in Gloucester County a home for a week that is warm, inviting and fun. Our guests have a difficult life while staying with us, so we try to make it as comfortable and welcoming as possible.

The good news is that ALL the families that we hosted in May will be graduating in 4-6 weeks. Many full-time jobs have been found, cars have been secured, and Catholic Charities is offering to pay for half of their security deposits on new apartments. Family Promise is helping the families acquire the skills necessary to help them in the future, including money management, job training, and resume building classes, as well as family counseling.

Even as families are graduating from the program, 21 more families are on the waiting list. Our work is needed now more than ever. Our work with Family Promise is making an impact in the lives of the families we help. We are helping those in our community that need a little lift at the most difficult time in their lives. Thank you to our Family Promise volunteers; you are a committed and loving group that is impacting the lives of people in need. You help our guests feel at home and forget the stress of their situation. I thank God for your participation, and for our ability to participate in God's work through Family Promise in Gloucester County.
