

We are All Tom Bodett

"...and we'll leave the lights on for you."

Since 1986, Motel 6 has been using the same catch phrase— "We'll leave the light on for you." Maybe it's an example of excellent branding and corporate creep into culture, but it also captures something else.

It takes a symbol of "home"—leaving the lights on for a family member that is coming home late—and turns it into a branded characteristic. A symbol of corporate identity and personal hospitality. When we think Motel 6, we think of that catch phrase, which gets us thinking about home, which (generally) makes us feel positive about the company. It's brilliant.

But the catchphrase also serves as a short hand—as a way of expressing corporate values and ideals in a pithy way. Motel 6 wants to be our home away from home; the place where we show up when we are tired and out too late; the place where we can rest and relax. Motel 6 wants us to think about hospitality—and they want us to

believe that they care about it.

This leads me to a question: how do we at Holy Trinity get this idea across? How do we let people know that we are a hospitable place—that hospitality is one of our core values, part of the fabric and make-up of Holy Trinity? How do we capture...

"...we'll leave the lights on for you."

There are a few ways we have already started making Holy Trinity a welcoming place for newcomers—three in fact. Each of the ways was intentionally done to make finding, visiting, and joining-in at Holy Trinity easier.

- 1. **Finding Holy Trinity.** For years, after moving into a new town, folks would open the Yellow Pages and look for a new church (of their variety) in the area. People still do the same thingexcept, instead of thumbing through yellow pages they Google "churches near me." A church's website is the new the front door of church. Information must be up-to-date, directions and expectations easy to find, and it must be aesthetically pleasing and engaging. We have worked to do just that with our new church website and we are already seeing an increase in unique traffic and visitors who say they found us through the website.
- 2. Visiting Holy Trinity. Finding the church is the first step; visiting is the next. 28% of adults in America now consider themselves to have no religious affiliations. The mainline church has been shrinking since its peak in the 1950s; Christians of all varieties now put "denominational affiliation" low on their list of requirements. At the top of the list are things like "people are friendly," "service is easy to follow," and "preaching is entertaining but also connects with my daily life." The Episcopal Church has a lot going for it, but our service can be a brick wall for newcomers. Pew aerobics, juggling books, singing parts of the service-these things add stress and anxiety for people who (1) already feel like everyone is watching them and (2) are not certain about this whole church thing. Thus, it is our responsibility, as hospitable hosts, to

make the church-going experience as smooth as possible (without sacrificing tradition). In the winter the church needs to be warm; in summer it needs to be cool. The bulletin needs to be informational, but easy to follow; Episcopal but easily accessible to a non-Episcopalian. For these reasons, we have begun printing the responses in the 10 AM section of the bulletin. This is not an attempt to move people away from using the Book of Common Prayer, but to help newcomers and visitors find a way to participate in the life and worship of Holy Trinity without the burden of extra stress and anxiety. Everyone already brings their burdens, baggage, and business to church; we don't need to add any more to it by being intentionally (or unintentionally) exclusive.

3. Joining In at Holy Trinity. The last step in attracting and keeping new members is to find a way to help people join in the life of Holy Trinity. How do we get a frequent visitor to graduate to an active member? The answer to this is twofold. First and foremost, the best way to get people to join-in is to invite them; and the best way to

invite people is through intentional and aesthetically appealing invites (be they social media, personal, mailings, or newsletters). Churches complain that the number one issue they have in their parishes is difficulty communicating. We do a lot of talking, hold a lot of events, and make a lot of announcements—but it doesn't connect. How many times have you seen something long and boring and heavy with the words and just scrolled past? To get people to join in, we need them to be interested in what we are doing-and we do that through attractive print materials (like the new Banner redesign). The second thing—and this one requires very little work or money—is to invite people. Talk to the visitors around you; invite them to church events; invite them to Coffee Hour and learn about their lives and families. The most powerful evangelism tool that everyone has access to is our ability to invite people to things that matter to us. Its true on Facebook and its true in life: a share goes further than a like. You can tell people about how much you like a certain restaurant or dessert or car, but until you share it with them, until they've eaten it or driven it—it will only ever be a "like."

These three areas are based on a program called "Invite, Welcome, Connect"—a program developed by the Diocese of Texas to help visitors become attenders become members. You'll be hearing more about this in the coming months, but for now, if you only get one things out of this letter, I hope that you can see that the new Banner, the new church website, the new printed bulletin with responses, they are all trying to get to the same thing—it's our way of saying...

"We'll leave the lights on for you."

2018 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN



OFFERTORY SENTENCE

Every week, after we finish with the announcements, pronounce the blessings, and invite everyone to Communion, I say the same "offertory sentence." I have options, there are a bunch to choose from, but I always use the same one from the Apostle Paul:

"Walk in love, as Christ loved us, and gave himself for us, and offering an sacrifice to God." Ephesians 5:2 (RSV)

I like this offertory sentence because it reminds us of what we are doing. We have this tendency to separate the work of the church from the running of the church. Money is the "worldly stuff" that sneaks its way into church in anonymous envelopes and crumpled up bills. Even mentioning money—or passing the plate for that matter—makes us nervous and uncomfortable. We can begin to feel like "why is God soiling God's hands with this "yuck" money!?"

But this offertory sentence points us in the right direction. St. Paul says: "Walk in love." He is reminding us—the church—that our primary work is forward movement in love. We aren't walking on a treadmill, or in circles around our house trying to get Fitbit points. We are walking out in the world. Furthermore, we aren't just walking without purpose or interests. We aren't being forced to walk, it's not the mandatory four laps around the high school track.

No! We are being called to walk in love. And not just any love, but in the same way that Christ loved us. This is no walk around the park. This is about self-offering; this is about faithfulness; this is about what's in our hearts, not what's in our pockets.

And this gets to the heart of the "offertory." When we take an offering, it's not about money, or service, or expectation, or anything like that.

It's about our hearts. It's about learning to walk in love. It's about giving of ourselves as a reflection of that commitment to and feeling of love.

ANOTHER "STEWARDSHIP SEASON?"

Across the Church, October begins "Stewardship Season"—a time all God-fearing folks have come to loathe. It's in these few weeks that all the gimmicks are pulled out. Lights are turned off during the service. TVs and other big-ticket items are raffled off. Church becomes an NPR membership campaign with no end in sight (and without all the best NPR swag). In "Stewardship Season" shame, expectation, and demand rule the roost.

And we stop. We stop listening. We stop responding. We stop giving. We stop walking in love.

Because when the Christian life becomes another opportunity for a shake-down, "walking in love" gets turned into a euphemism for rote acts of charity—for empty acts of giving.

So, this year—like last year—let's not. Because the truth is: it's not about money. It's about our hearts.

SACRIFICE OF THANKSGIVING

Instead, we can take our lead from what Paul says: the description of what "walking in love," like Jesus, looks like:

"An offering and sacrifice to God."

In the Old Testament, people would make sacrifices to God for a lot of reasons. There were two primary reasons: (1) forgiveness of sins and (2) thanksgiving. Forgiveness of sins we get; people have always needed a way to atone or make up for the things we do wrong and the ways we do wrong. A sacrifice would show that viscerally.

But sacrifices of thanksgiving are different. That's how we describe the gifts offered during communion: the bread, the wine, and the offering. Sacrifices of thanksgiving are in the domain of the heart—the overflowing of our hearts to God's. Sacrifices of thanksgiving come from a place where we recognize that God's grace and love are abundant, that we are blessed beyond measure, and that all our blessings come from God. Our offerings—time, treasure, and talent—are our way of saying "Thank You" to God: the same God that saves us, forgives us, and blesses us.

THANK YOU

So instead of catchy gimmicks and smooth talks, let's try something else. Let's talk about things we are thankful for.

I am thankful to be part of a church that cares about children. We have seen a huge growth in youth participation in the Dance Ensemble, in worship, and in youth activities. We have generous adult volunteers who help with those ministries, who make dinners and drive vans, and put up with endless conversations about Shrek. I am thankful for our commitment to help these kids grow in faith and show them what it means to be a Christian—to walk in love

I am thankful for our church leadership. I am thankful for their help in shaping Holy Trinity's mission and vision. I am thankful for their ability to read the congregation and identify the core values that make us unique and point us to where God is calling. I am thankful for their commitment of time, talent, and energy for the church.



I am thankful for a church that is naturally welcoming and hospitable. I am thankful for a vestry and congregation that is interested in and longs to reach out and invite new people into the life of the church and a knowledge of Jesus Christ. I am thankful for their support in creating a new website, publicizing and advertising for Holy Trinity more frequently, and making our services and activities as inclusive and welcoming as possible.

Finally, I am thankful to be here. To be leading a congregation of faithful, God-loving people, who know what it means to love the world, who know what it means to walk in love, and who know what it means to love our neighbors as ourselves.

I could not be more thankful for Holy Trinity. And, from that place of thankfulness, from that heartwarming, love-showing, awe-inspiring



place, I make my pledge for our 2018 Stewardship campaign.

Because I have been blessed to walk in love with all of you. And I know that together—and with God at our center—we can love others.

It ain't about the money—it's all about the love. And I love y'all.
