


Forged in Revolution: The Creation & History of the Episcopal Church

Sun., Jan. 7, 14 & 28; Feb. 4 & 11 2018 at 9 AM in the Parish Hall



In the midst of Revolution, members of the Church of England in the American colonies were left with a choice: return to England or find a new way to worship. Join us at 9 AM on Sunday mornings for "Forged in Revolution," a five week study on the history of the Episcopal Church. Whether you're a life-long Episcopalian or new to the church, there will be something for everyone.

The first of a three-part series, you are invited in this Lenten season on a journey through Holy Week as a witness to the last week of Jesus Christ. Divided over five weeks and taught by our rector, "Witness" will offer an in-depth, biblical look at the important events of Holy Week, inviting attendees to walk next to Jesus, and to stand as witness to this solemn event, from his entry into Jerusalem to his death on the cross.

The next two series are: "Our Hearts Burned: Meeting the Risen Christ" and "Clothed with Power: The Birth of Ekklesia." They will continue through the end of May.

"This is the new year / and I don't feel any different."

Dear Holy Trinity,

Last year at this time, I wrote my second letter to Holy Trinity imagining what this new call—this new adventure—might bring. I reminded everyone that it's not our successful completion of resolutions that make us the people God wants us to be. It's not the boxes checked, the things left done or undone. No, its about our relationship to our God-made-man Jesus Christ.

It seems right to circle back to this idea—and the song "The New Year" by Death Cab for Cutie from their 2003 album *Transatlanticism*—the questions about what the new year, new call, new move, new job, new life might bring.

"This is the new year / and I don't feel any different." So sings Death Cab's front man Ben Gibbard in the first line of the song.

Do you feel different? Good different, bad different, or just different different?

Just because we don't feel different doesn't mean we aren't different.

The world is a different place than it was a year ago. We are different

people than we were a year ago. We've had new experiences—good, bad, and ugly—that will shape us for years to come. We met new loved ones and lost others. We've seen new things start and old things end.

Although I still believe that judging a year based on achievement is not the best way to judge our time on earth (I probably lean more towards a "Seasons of Love" measurement from *Rent*); it is a good time to stop and reflect on the year that has past.

For me, that year has been a whirl-wind. Moving 1600 miles. Entering a new role. Meeting and caring for new people. Learning a new town and new system. Making sure I don't mess up too spectacularly. Mostly, I'm just flabbergasted that it's already been a year. It sees like just yesterday.

As I reflect, I'm thankful for the year that we had together. There were things I could've done better. There are things I could've done worse. But, all-in-all, it was a good year.

If there's one thing I learned from the last year, it's the importance of relationships. Becoming your rector, being welcomed into your lives, being with you through the best and worst that life has to offer: it has changed me in a profound way.

You have changed me in a profound way. And for that, I am so grateful. And so thankful that God called me to this place with all of you.

So, as you reflect on the last year,

maybe you don't feel any different. Maybe you didn't make any resolutions. Maybe you're overjoyed that 2017 is history. But here is something that I know for certain; even if we don't feel different, we are different.

We are different because we have shared a year together, blended our lives and loves together, and offered them in faithful obedience to God. God has worked in every second of every minute of every hour of our days. The whole of creation calls us, pleading and begging with us to remember that everything is different, that everything changed 2000 years ago when God "became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14), a "light shining in the darkness" (John 1:5), the "lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29).

We are different because God has spent another year reminding us of the Good News of the Gospel—that Jesus Christ came to be with us, to call us out of sin and pain, and invite us into a new world.

I'm thankful for 2017. I'm thankful for the reminder of the Good News of the Gospel.

And I know that this is the new year, and even though I don't feel any different, that everything is being brought to perfection by the one at who's name every knee shall bow and every tongue confess.

In Review: 2017

The 2018 Annual Meeting is upon us, but this time with something new: bylaws!

2018 ANNUAL MEETING

On January 21, 2018 we will hold our annual parish meeting. According to the canons of the Episcopal Church and the Diocese of New Jersey, we are required to hold an annual meeting to (1) present the budget to the congregation, (2) elect new members to the vestry and representatives to diocesan roles, and (3) reflect on the prior year of ministry.

This year we will do something a bit different. We will begin worshiping together at a **combined service at 9 AM**. The service will be a mixture of both Rite I and Rite II services, and will be a time to worship, pray, and give thanks together. Following the service, we will gather in the undercroft for refreshments and for the **2018 Annual Meeting at 10:30 AM**. The meeting should take about an hour to an hour-and-a-half. Light food will be served. It will include elections, presentation of the budget, a presentation from our rector, and one more piece that is special for 2018: passing of bylaws!

BYLAWS: WHAT FOR?

The canons of the Episcopal Church and the Diocese of New Jersey recognize the relative autonomy of self-sustaining parishes. To ensure that those parishes operate appropriately and (somewhat) uniformly, and in compliance with all national and diocesan expectations, parishes are required to have bylaws:governing documents

about the structure and running of the parish. Typically, bylaws are written and approved prior to the transition from mission to self-sustaining parish.

For whatever reason, Holy Trinity has never had officially bylaws (or, if they did, they have subsequently been lost by both the church and the Diocese.) Our rector established a bylaws committee to draft bylaws. They were presented to the vestry at the November meeting, and were approved within the first weeks of December. They are available for you to read and comment on here.

The final step is presentation, comment, and approval of the bylaws by the congregation. At the annual meeting, after the presentations by the treasurer and rector, the bylaws will be presented for comment and vote. Amendments offered by the bylaws committee will be offered. Then a vote will take place.

You are highly encouraged to "read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest" the proposed bylaws. If you have comments, concerns, or suggested corrections, please email our rector so he can address the issues before the meeting.

Approving bylaws for Holy Trinity is a big and important step in moving the church toward accountability and transparency. It is also a big symbolic step in owning our self-governance and preparing for the future. We hope that you will be a part of this momentous occasion in the life and ministry of Holy Trinity.

Have you Considered Donating Altar Flowers?

Most Sundays (except during Lent), flower arrangements flank the communion table. These flowers are an offering to God as an act of thanksgiving: an offering of beauty and fragrance for the creator, redeemer, and sustainer of the world. The flowers are also offered with special intention for the needs and thanksgiving of our community, including commemorating birthdays, anniversaries, births, special events, and remembrances. Also, you get to take the blessed flowers home to your family!

The vestry and altar guild have noticed that the quality of the altar flowers has been declining, and we are in the process of looking for a new florist. It is our intention to offer the first and best to God, and we want to make sure the flower arrangements are showing that.

We also recognize that the quality of the flowers may be responsible for the lack of volunteers to offer arrangements. We are hoping that in changing the florist, members might be more willing to offer arrangements. Furthermore, during Ordinary Time (the season after Pentecost), we will only have flower arrangements if they have been donated, or if there is a special event or occasion. **Would you consider offering altar flowers?**

It is our hope that these changes might encourage more folks to donate flowers for Sunday mornings. If you would like to do so, arrangements are \$30 and you can sign up on the Flower Calendar, next to the parish hall. Thank you to everyone who already offers flowers for Sunday.

Scripture of the Month

What's in a name?

As we move beyond Christmas into the season of Epiphany, we celebrate the revelation that Jesus is God incarnate. In Isaiah chapter 9, we see the promise of the coming Messiah. In verse 6, we are given a list of names that he will be called. Our translation of choice, the New Revised Standard Version, reads as such:

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

Most translations agree on the four names, though some

make it a list of five, separating Wonderful and Counselor as two different names. The New English translation, instead of Wonderful Counselor, offers "Extraordinary Strategist." The Orthodox Jewish translation, instead of Everlasting Father, gives us "Possessor of Eternity." The nuances among the translations can offer us additional context to scripture. It's often a good idea when you're sitting down to study, to have at least two different translations to compare, and with the internet, the options for translations become virtually limitless. Verses that you've practically memorized can become fresh again with the nuance of a different translation. Give it a try!






WORSHIP
