Easter isn’t Christmas. It doesn’t get the same level of cultural effort that Christmas does. We don’t spend lots of money on presents; we don’t listen to Easter music on repeat; and we don’t count down the days (using cheap, delicious chocolates) to Easter, except if it’s the first or last day of Spring Break. Culturally, the world doesn’t care about Easter.

And that’s not a bad thing.

Last month I talked about how Lent is supposed to prepare us for Holy Week; that it’s a time to reflect, repent, and move back to God. But why would anyone want to do this? Contemplating one’s own sinfulness and mortality doesn’t make you the life of any parties, doesn’t win you any prizes, and its hard work. Why prepare for Holy Week—a week that culminates in a holiday society ignores—at all?

The answer to that is woven into the fabric of Holy Week. For some, Holy Week is just another week, with the added bonus of a half-day on Friday and a big family dinner on Sunday. But for us, for Christians, it’s something so much more.

It’s sacred “cosplay.” If you aren’t familiar cosplay—short for “costume play”—is a practice that comes from Japan, specifically from within the *anime* and *manga* sub-culture. According to Wikipedia: “Cosplay (コスプレ) is a performance art in which participants called cosplayers wear costumes...to represent a specific character...a broader use of the term “cosplay” applies to any costumed role-playing in venues apart from the stage. Any entity that lends itself to dramatic interpretation may be taken up as a subject...Favorite sources include manga and anime, comic books and cartoons, video games, and live-action films and television series.”

Cosplay isn’t like dress-up, make-believe, or role-playing; cosplay is something very different. Cosplay takes its subject material *very seriously*, and in so doing, brings it to

life. Yes, the original source material is colorful, imaginative, and purely fiction—but cosplayers don’t care. Their concern is bringing “this”—their love of the material and characters, the message and meaning of the art, and their own creativity—into life, bringing something far off near.

The church has a term for this practice—it’s called *real presence*. It’s what we believe happens with we participate in Communion—that Jesus becomes *really present* with us in the prayer, breaking of bread, and sharing of the meal. When we participate in Communion, we aren’t pretending, playing make-believe, or role playing. We are bringing something that we love, that has so much meaning to us—that has the ability to TRANSFORM THE WORLD—to life through the work and inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

And this is why Holy Week is the most wonderful time of the year: because it’s the time of year that is thick with meaning and heavy with memory, and where Christ’s presence is *palpable*—through liturgy, prayer, and scripture. (cont. on pg. 4)



Holy Week Schedule

Sunday, April 9, 2016

Palm Sunday Service of Palms & Holy Communion, 8:00 AM and 10:00 AM

A Celebration of Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem, we will gather for the Service of Palms outside (weather permitting) and process into the service, hailing Jesus as King.

Thursday, April 13, 2016

Agape Meal, 6:00 PM

As the meal shared with the Disciples, the Agape Meal (or "Love Feast") is a fellowship meal punctuated with prayers and readings. All are welcome. Requested donation of \$10 per family. Sign up in the Narthex or online at <http://bit.ly/agapemealsvp>.

Maundy Thursday Service of Footwashing & Holy Communion, 7:00 PM

A service where the three final instructions of Jesus are remembered: to wash feet, to love one another, to "do this in remembrance of me." This service will feature footwashing, First Holy Communion for new communicants, and concludes with the Stripping of the Altar.

Note: There will be no Altar of Repose or Vigil. We will conclude the service with the starkness of the stripped altar and an empty church. As we will not be having communion from the reserved sacrament, we will not need an altar of repose. The chapel will be open for prayer and contemplation upon request.

Friday, April 14, 2016

Community Good Friday Service, 12:00 PM – 1:30 PM

The service will be held at Barnsboro United Methodist Church (677 Main St., Sewell, NJ 08080). It is hosted by the Woodbury Heights/Mantua/Wenonah Ministerium and will feature five, brief reflections by local clergy, music, and prayers. All are welcome.

Stations of the Cross, 6:30 PM

A solemn service of prayer and readings, Stations of the Cross follows Jesus from his judgment to the tomb. It fills in the story between Thursday and Friday.

Good Friday Service, 7:00 PM

The climax of the Triduum (Latin for "three days"), Good Friday is a powerful service remembering Jesus' passion and death for our sins, and marking the moment of his sacrifice.

Note: There will be no reserved Communion this year at the Good Friday service. We, like Jesus, "will not drink from this fruit of the vine" (Matt. 26:29) and forego Communion until Easter. This is to emphasize the dramatic change from Thursday to Sunday—when we put away the presence of Jesus for three days—and wait for the resurrection.

Saturday, April 15, 2016

Holy Saturday Service, 9:00 AM

The nadir of the Three Days, this short service or prayers and readings contemplates the mystery of a God who has experienced death.

The Easter Vigil, 7:00 PM

The first service of Easter, the Easter Vigil uses reading, prayer, and the work of the Holy Trinity Dance Ensemble to place the resurrection at the center of human history. The service features the lighting of the New Fire, baptisms, and the first Communion of Easter (and the first since Thursday).

Sunday, April 16, 2016

Feast of the Resurrection, Spoken Service with Communion (Rite I), 8:00 AM

Feast of the Resurrection, Sung Service with Communion (Rite II), 10:00 AM; Nursery Available

Easter Egg Hunt & Coffee Hour, 11:30 AM

My First Convention Experience



The most recent Diocesan Convention was the first I had ever attended. We opened with worship, which was great to do with a roomful of hundreds of fellow Episcopalians. It was a full service, with a sermon from Becca Stevens on sex trafficking, which was shocking but informative. After receiving communion from Bishop Stokes himself, our Holy Trinity crew snuck out for a nice Italian lunch. Jackie Gould, Joanne Hutchison and I ordered fish and chips. Very tasty!

Then came business. Bishop Stokes led with his address and reminded us that the church is committed to standing with the vulnerable. We then heard reports from many of the various committees of the Diocese. It's amazing to get some detail on the people and places they influence. In addition to hearing annual reports from various Canons, we also voted for committee members. There were packets with pictures and bios of all the candidates in case you didn't recognize them by name. Voting took place for several resolutions, notably an official announcement that the Diocese is now a "Sanctuary Diocese." This means that they are

committed to standing with immigrants and migrants, offering them education and organization, and in some cases even housing them when appropriate. Our Holy Trinity crew attended a supplementary workshop on immigration to see how some Episcopal churches are already reaching out to the immigrant community.

As may be expected, there was a plentiful amount of discussion when it came to the budget and the various financial decisions that needed to be made. The Canon for Youth Ministry, for example, was going to be cut from full to part-time, but the people spoke and demanded that she keep her full-time position. Delegates who wished to speak lined up at the microphones and patiently waited to air their thoughts. Finances aren't always fun, but the Diocese is struggling financially and is asking the churches to step up in their giving.

The second and final day of the Convention ended quietly with a reading of the Necrology, the priests who passed away the

previous year. It was a somber and gentle way to end a long two days of discussion, education, and networking.

You can't help but feel closer to the church after attending the Annual Convention. I recommend it to everyone.

Wanted: Eucharistic Ministers, Adult and Youth Lectors!

As you sit in church and listen to the lessons being read, haven't you occasionally thought *"Wow! That person reads really well! I wonder if I could ever read that well?"* or *"Wow! Those kids have a lot of courage, to get up there and read something that difficult!"* or *"Wow! That reading was really long..."*

Holy Trinity has a wonderful group of lectors and Eucharistic Ministers who do read extremely well (despite the lectionary's occasionally strange and lengthy choices in readings). We also have some marvelous young people who read the lessons and lead the psalm each Family Sunday, the first Sunday of each month. But we could use more readers, both adult and youth, particularly at 8:00, and more Eucharistic ministers at both services, and we would love to have you join us!

The time commitment is minimal, and yet the readers do get both assistance and input. Once every other month a team of our adult readers and Eucharistic ministers get together with Father Ben and me, to schedule who reads when, and then read through and discuss all of the readings for the upcoming month. This meeting seldom lasts more than an hour, but it results in confident and relaxed readers, and Sunday morning

lessons which are articulate and understandable.

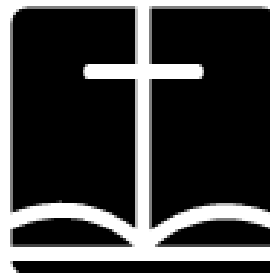
The youth readers also read in teams, but their teams tend to work together on the same readings: most of the time on Family Sunday you will see a reading or a psalm divided up between two or three readers. This approach makes the readings easier for younger readers, while also giving them added support until they are old (and experienced) enough to handle a reading on their own. I type out the readings for them, assign them which parts they will read, and then rehearse with them for a couple of weeks to make sure that they are comfortable and confident when they get up there to read before the congregation.

The Eucharistic ministers also get training before they have to get up there behind the communion rail. Since Father Ben started, we have two Eucharistic Ministers each Sunday at the 10:00 service: one who does the readings and handles the communion chalice for the first half of the rail, and the other is the intercessor (leading the Prayers of the People) and handles the communion chalice for the second half of the rail. This means that our current Eucharistic Ministers are doing double duty, so if a few more people wanted to participate in this ministry, we would be thrilled! We only have one Eucharistic Minister at the 8:00 services, but at the moment we only have two of them, and so they are up there all the time! It would be nice to have at least one more at 8:00 too!

Have you been thinking that you would like to be a bit more involved at Holy Trinity? That your kids would benefit from getting up in front of the congregation once in a while? (We've proved that kids who read aloud in church tend to do better in school, because they become more confident!) That it might be fun to read scripture out loud for this wonderfully understanding and sympathetic congregation? That you could probably handle a chalice without spilling wine all over someone during communion? Then please talk with Father Ben or me about becoming – or having your kids become – one of Holy Trinity's lectors or Eucharistic ministers!
